
ENDING THE POWERS OF COMMUNISTS

EYOND question, the reception given throughout Australia to the anti-Communist Bill shows that the vast majority of the people approve the Government's resolve to eradicate the Communist party and to end its evil machinations in our midst. The central purpose is thus beyond cavilthat of defeating the Communists and putting them out of business as wreckers and despoilers.
